

# Mottisfont NATIONAL TRUST


Ancient trees and rolling lawns frame this intriguing 18th-century house with a medieval priory at its heart. Make sure you see the extraordinary drawing-room painted by Rex Whistler.

The beautiful gardens are a feast for the senses all year round, where winding paths meander through stately trees, all with the sound of water never far away. There's a wild play area for kids, a shop and places to eat.

It's just a 10 minute walk from the bus stop on the main road.

## Romsey

The magnificent Norman abbey dominates the town with medieval streets clustered around it. The abbey can trace its origins back to AD 907.



Look out for the medieval King John's House, Tudor Cottage and former Victorian gun shop which now form a new heritage centre and tearoom with a series of period gardens leading down to a bubbling mill stream.

At the busy Farmers' Market, held on the first Sunday of the month, you can buy top quality products grown or made in the area.
